150th Anniversary of the Civil War Observed

This year, the nation is commemorating the sesquicentennial of the start of the Civil War, which began before dawn on April 12, 1861 with the Confederate bombardment of the Union-held Fort Sumter in Charleston, South Carolina. You have heard of the subsequent Battle of Gettysburg in Pennsylvania. But did you know that during the same month and year as that famous battle, there was a Civil War skirmish along the National Road in Ohio? On July 24, 1863, General John Hunt Morgan and 600 of his Confederate cavalymen, known as Morgan's Raiders, paused in the Guernsey County town of Old Washington to look for food. They stopped at the American Hotel (now demolished) and while dining were attacked by pursuing Union forces led by Brig. General James Shackelford. The raiders returned gunfire and in the exchange, three Confederate soldiers were killed. Local residents buried their bodies in the Old Washington cemetery which overlooks the village. This stone and a Civil War Historical Marker now stand near where the Confederates were laid to rest.



May 1-7, 2011 National Road Bicentennial Caravan of the Bells

The six-state National Road Alliance celebrated the bicentennial of the beginning of construction on the National Road with a 700-mile Caravan of Bells. The journey began on May 1st at the end of the Road in Vandalia, Illinois and ended at the site of its beginning in Cumberland, Maryland on the 200th anniversary of the groundbreaking on May 7th. To honor the history of early travelers, the caravan carried brass harness bells which had been created to symbolize those worn on the harnesses of the draught teams that pulled the Conestoga wagons on the National Road. Starting with one bell from Illinois, a bell was added at each state line until the full set of six (for the number of states through which the Historic National Road crossed) was presented to the City of Cumberland. Ohio's bell (the third of six) was added at the Wayne Co. Historical Museum in Richmond, when the Indiana National Road Association handed the bells off to the Ohio National Road Association on May 3rd. From there it was on to a reception in Englewood and an overnight stay. The next day, the caravan traveled through Montgomery, Miami, Clark, Madison and into Franklin County, where they were led by a horse-drawn wagon (and police escort!) along the historic route of the Road on East Main Street. After participating in a combined Bicentennial and Ribbon-cutting celebration with Columbus Mayor Mike Coleman and Columbus Compact Corporation CEO (and ONRA's own) Jon Beard at the newly created park and renovated Old National Road Condominiums in Olde Town East, the caravan was led by National Trail Raceway's El Camino and "sped" (literally) to the Race track near Hebron. A vintage truck club joined the convoy and proceeded via some old Road segments through Licking County, stopping at Eagle's Nest Monument and Muskingum County's Headley Inn/Smith House, then over the Y-bridge before stopping for the night. The next morning participants and guests were treated to breakfast and a tour at the National Road/Zane Grey Museum, before heading east to Cambridge for a brief ceremony on the lawn of the Guernsey County Courthouse. After lunch at the Deep Cut Tavern, the last stop in Ohio was at the site of the July 4, 1825 groundbreaking of Ohio's portion of the National Road, the Belmont County Courthouse in St. Clairsville. There Ohio said "goodbye" to the caravan, the fourth bell was added, and the Caravan of Bells was handed off to Jeremy Morris, who was representing the West Virginia National Road Association. NOTE: As a consequence of all the inclement weather, the number of vehicles in the caravan varied from six to dozens, but a core group of three automobiles made the entire trip—a 1953 Ford Victoria driven by Ron and Shirley Stauffer of Portland, IN, a 1980 Mercedes driven by Debbie Wentz with passenger Mary Truitt, President of the National Road Association of Illinois, and a 1934 Buick carrying Gary and Marcie Kruger of Effingham, IL and their passenger Belinda Roddy of Martinsville, IL. A fourth car, driven by Paul Schubert of Bath, OH participated as far as St. Clairsville. We appreciated having them in Ohio!

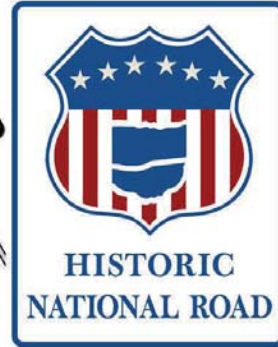
